2016 is the centenary of the founding of the Society for Glass Technology. To mark this event this study day aims to consider how different people in different times have gone about making much better glass. Glass has always been a complex material and making much better glass has demanded, amongst other things: investment; organisational change; improved raw materials; glassmaker training and education; new processes; and new furnace technologies. However, behind every successful development there have been, often unlikely, innovators who have played critical roles.

The talks will examine some of the transformational changes that have occurred in glassmaking prior to 1930 that each generated the capability to make much better glass, identifying the critical changes and the key people and organisations that made these happen.
